529 Plan	Coverdell Education Savings Account (ESA)	UTMA/UGMA (Custodial) Account
<b>Annual Contribution Limit:</b> \$14,000 per individual (\$28,000 if married). There is a special rule for these plans as a \$70,000 contribution can be made in one year (\$140,000 if married) and prorated over a five-year period with the contributor incurring a gift tax liability or reducing one's unified gift and estate tax credit.	<b>Annual Contribution Limit:</b> \$2,000 per year per beneficiary.	<b>Annual Contribution Limit:</b> \$14,000 per year per beneficiary (\$28,000 if married)
<b>Total Contributions Allowed:</b> Varies by plan – typically between \$350,000 and \$375,000.	<b>Total Contributions Allowed:</b> No limit as long as no more than \$2,000 is contributed each year.	<b>Total Contributions Allowed:</b> No limit as long as no more than \$14,000 (or \$28,000 if married) is contributed each year.
<b>Income Limit to Be Eligible to Contribute:</b> None	<b>Income Limit to Be Eligible to Contribute:</b> For individual filers, they are eligible to contribute if their adjusted gross income (AGI) is under \$95,000. Between \$95,000 and \$110,000, the amount is reduced, and for AGIs over \$110,000, they are no longer able to contribute to this plan. For married filers, if their AGI is under \$90,000, they can contribute the maximum amount. Between \$190,000 and \$220,000, the amount is reduced, and for AGIs over \$220,000, they are no longer able to contribute to this plan.	<b>Income Limit to Be Eligible to Contribute:</b> None.
<b>Use of Funds:</b> Qualified post-secondary education-related expenses, such as tuition, fees, room and board, books, and supplies.	<b>Use of Funds:</b> Education expenses such as required books, tuition and room and board for kindergarten through high school, college and graduate school.	<b>Use of Funds:</b> Any use that benefits the child.
<b>Control:</b> Owner maintains control of the assets, decides when withdrawals will be made, and can make beneficiary changes.	<b>Control:</b> Beneficiary may assume control at age of majority, typically 18 or 21 in most states.	<b>Control:</b> Beneficiary assumes control at age of majority, typically 18 or 21 in most states.
<b>Investment Options:</b> Varies by plan – some have static portfolios, age-based portfolios, or ability to build a portfolio using a list of specific funds chosen by the plan provider.	<b>Investment Options:</b> No limitations.	<b>Investment Options:</b> No limitations.
<b>Changes to Investments:</b> They can be changed once each calendar year or when beneficiary is changed.	<b>Changes to Investments:</b> They can be changed anytime.	<b>Changes to Investments:</b> They can be changed anytime, but each transfer is usually a taxable event.
<b>Tax Treatment:</b> Earnings accumulate on a tax free basis and withdrawals for qualified post-secondary education expenses can be accessed tax-free.	<b>Tax Treatment:</b> Earnings accumulate on a tax free basis and withdrawals for qualified elementary, secondary and post-secondary education expenses can be accessed tax-free.	<b>Tax Treatment:</b> For beneficiaries under age 19 and full-time students under age 24 whose earned income is less than one-half of their support, the first \$1,000 of earnings is tax-free. Earnings between \$1,000 and \$2,050 are taxed at the child's rate; earnings above \$2,050 are taxed at the parents' rate.
<b>Penalties on Non-Qualified Withdrawals:</b> Ordinary income taxes plus a 10% federal tax penalty on earnings.	<b>Penalties on Non-Qualified Withdrawals:</b> Ordinary income taxes plus a 10% federal tax penalty on earnings.	<b>Penalties on Non-Qualified Withdrawals:</b> Not applicable. Funds can be withdrawn at any time for any reason as long as it is for the benefit of the child.
